What is it that you seek?

The first words out of the mouth of Jesus in the Gospel of John don't come in the form of a statement, a precept or a law. They come in the form of a question! But it's a question that cuts right to the heart of who we are as human beings:

What are you seeking? What is it that you are longing for?

As scripture scholar Raymond E. Brown points out, "This question touches on the basic need of humans that causes us to turn to God."

The two young men who had been drawn to Jesus and were following close behind him must have been caught off guard with his question. They risked a question of their own in return, "Rabbi, where are you staying?"

Jesus doesn't rebuke them for dodging his question. Instead, he responds with three simple words that held both an invitation and a promise:

Come and See!

It represents a shared philosophy of action/reflection in the formation and practice of ministry and faithful living. Seems like a simple response—invitational even—but on a deeper level, Jesus is providing an answer to his own question:

Come, follow me and you'll discover what you're looking for. Come and see what it really means to live in the light of God.

Through his invitation to come and see, Jesus invites those first disciples—and he invites us to join him on a journey of faith. This is not a journey of the head. No, this is a journey of the heart—it's a living faith journey that promises to reveal what it means to walk from darkness to light—from death to new life. It is a journey that is not so much about following the law that had been originally written on stone tablets but about living the spirit behind that law with renewed hearts. It's a journey that involves a deepening relationship with God. It is a covenant journey.

This month, we marked a new chapter in the life of St. Paul's United Church. We are grateful to be covenanting with Rev. Christina Crawford to lead us and walk with us on this next part of **our** journey as a faith community.

In a very real sense, our journey over the past two years has been a response to the same question that Jesus asked those first followers in John's Gospel:

What is it that you seek?

And moving forward, we count on Rev. Christina to hold that same question in front of us. In turn, we need to hold that question in front of Rev. Christina, as our spiritual leader.

May our life and work here at St. Paul's continue to be inspired by the powerful question that Jesus asked his first followers, and may our response always be a robust and faithful:

Come and See!

He didn't offer to take her shopping to help relieve her pain, nor was he quick with an aphorism or saying, like "time heals all wounds." Instead, he allowed her to experience her pain and express it, and he shared it with her. Jesus wept. (John 11:35)

As we enter the holiday season, may we give space to those who grieve to have a 'blue Christmas.' Let us share the gift of comfort and support for those who mourn. Please join us at St. Paul's Blue Christmas Service on December 18 at 3 p.m. May you be blessed with peace, love, and light as we celebrate the coming of our Lord and Saviour!
