# Today is the First Sunday of Lent.

The Lenten season is a part of the historical and liturgical Christian calendar. Although its format has varied throughout the centuries and throughout different cultures, the basic concept remains the same: to open our hearts to God's refining grace through prayer, confession, fasting, and almsgiving as we anticipate Holy Week. Lent traditionally lasts forty days, modeled after Christ's forty day fast in the desert, and ends on Good Friday. In the Western Church, Lent officially begins with a reminder of our mortality on Ash Wednesday (this year landing on March 6).

Like Advent, there are some of the key elements and symbols associated with the season of Lent. Many of these practices can be celebrated both individually and as a community:

Purple: The official color for Lent is purple. Purple can symbolize pain, suffering, and therefore mourning and penitence.

Confession: Lent calls for self-reflection and examination areas of lives that lead to our separation from God. It is a time to receive forgiveness and be open to the grace we need to change.

Fasting and Prayer: Fasting is a way of denying excesses in order we might be more attuned to the way of Jesus. To "give something up" makes space for something else. Hopefully a deeper relationship with God. Fasting should not be done to the detriment of one's physical or emotional state.

Giving alms: Lent can be a season to "take something up." Pick a particular charity, cause or ministry and devote some time and talent to its work. It is a reminder of how we all rely on the sacrifices of others to live.

Lent is a time to open the doors of our hearts a little wider and understand our Lord a little deeper, so that when Good Friday and eventually Easter comes, it is not just another day off from work or school, but an opportunity to receive the overflowing of graces God has to offer.
